500th ANNIVERSARY OF THE REFORMATION GEMS FROM MARTIN LUTHER (Concerning Prayer)

"If you do not intend to ask until you know or feel yourself worthy and fit, you must never ask. For, as was said before, our prayer must never be based or depend on our worthiness but on the immovable truth of the divine promise. If it is based on itself or on something else, it is false and deceives you, even though its deep devotion breaks your heart and moves you shed tears of blood. For we ask just because we are not worthy to ask; we become worthy to ask and to be heard just because we believe that we are unworthy; we make bold to ask only because of the faithfulness of God. Be as unworthy as you please, but note and observe with all your heart that a thousand times more (nay, everything) depends on your honoring God's truth and not turning His faithful promise into a lie by your doubt. For your worthiness does not help you; your unworthiness does not hinder you. But distrust damns you, and confidence makes you worthy and sustains you. Therefore watch as long as you live that you never consider yourself worthy of fit to ask or receive anything." (What Luther Says; Vol II #3446, Concordia Publishing House)
